Today's Collect

First Reading Isaiah 50: 4-9a

⁴The Lord G^{OD} has given me the tongue of a teacher, that I may know how to sustain the weary with a word.

Morning by morning he wakens—wakens my ear to listen as those who are taught.

⁵ The Lord G^{OD} has opened my ear, and I was not rebellious,

I did not turn backward.

6 I gave my back to those who struck me,

and my cheeks to those who pulled out the beard;

I did not hide my face

from insult and spitting.

⁷ The Lord G^{OD} helps me;

therefore I have not been disgraced;

therefore I have set my face like flint,

and I know that I shall not be put to shame;

8 he who vindicates me is near.

Who will contend with me?

Let us stand up together.

Who are my adversaries?

Let them confront me.

9 It is the Lord G^{OD} who helps me; who will declare me guilty?

Second Reading Philippians 2: 5-11

⁵ Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus,

6 who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited,

⁷ but emptied himself,

taking the form of a slave,

being born in human likeness.

And being found in human form,

- he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death even death on a cross.
- ⁹ Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name,
- 10 so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend,
 - in heaven and on earth and under the earth,
- 11 and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Praise to you, O Christ, king of eternal glory.

Christ humbled himself and became obedient unto death, even death on a cross. Therefore God has highly exalted him and given him the name that is above every name. Praise to you, O Christ, king of eternal glory.

Mark 14: 1-end of 15 Gospel

14 It was two days before the Passover and the festival of Unleavened Bread. The chief priests and the scribes were looking for a way to arrest Jesus [a] by stealth and kill him; 2 for they said, "Not during the festival, or there may be a riot among the people."

The Anointing at Bethany

³ While he was at Bethany in the house of Simon the leper, [b] as he sat at the table, a woman came with an alabaster jar of very costly ointment of nard, and she broke open the jar and poured the ointment on his head. 4 But some were there who said to one another in anger, "Why was the ointment wasted in this way? ⁵ For this ointment could have been sold for more than three hundred denarii, and the money given to the poor." And they scolded her. 6 But lesus said, "Let her alone; why do you trouble her? She has performed a good service for me. ⁷ For you always have the poor with you, and you can show kindness to them whenever you wish; but you will not always have me. 8 She has done what she could; she has anointed my body beforehand for its burial. 9 Truly I tell you, wherever the good news^[d] is proclaimed in the whole world, what she has done will be told in remembrance of her."

Judas Agrees to Betray Jesus

¹⁰Then Judas Iscariot, who was one of the twelve, went to the chief priests in order to betray him to them. ¹¹When they heard it, they were greatly pleased, and promised to give him money. So he began to look for an opportunity to betray him.

The Passover with the Disciples

¹²On the first day of Unleavened Bread, when the Passover lamb is sacrificed, his disciples said to him, "Where do you want us to go and make the preparations for you to eat the Passover?" 13 So he sent two of his disciples, saying to them, "Go into the city, and a man carrying a jar of water will meet you; follow him, 14 and wherever he enters, say to the owner of the house, 'The Teacher asks, Where is my guest room where I may eat the Passover with my disciples?' 15 He will show you a large room upstairs, furnished and ready. Make preparations for us there." 16 So the disciples set out and went to the city, and found everything as he had told them; and they prepared the Passover meal. ¹⁷When it was evening, he came with the twelve. ¹⁸ And when they had taken their places and were eating, lesus said, "Truly I tell you, one of you will betray me, one who is eating with me." 19 They began to be distressed and to say to him one after another, "Surely, not !?" ²⁰ He said to them, "It is one of the twelve, one who is dipping bread on the into the bowl^[] with me. ²¹ For the Son of Man goes as it is written of him, but woe to that one by whom the Son of Man is betrayed! It would have been better for that one not to have been born."

The Institution of the Lord's Supper

²² While they were eating, he took a loaf of bread, and after blessing it he broke it, gave it to them, and said, "Take; this is my body." ²³ Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he gave it to them, and all of them drank from it. ²⁴ He said to them, "This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many. 25 Truly I tell you, I will never again drink of the fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new in the kingdom of God."

Peter's Denial Foretold

²⁶ When they had sung the hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives. ²⁷ And Jesus said to them, "You will all become deserters; for it is written,

'I will strike the shepherd, and the sheep will be scattered.' ²⁸ But after I am raised up, I will go before you to Galilee." ²⁹ Peter said to him, "Even though all become deserters, I will not." ³⁰ Jesus said to him, "Truly I tell you, this day, this very night, before the cock crows twice, you will deny me three times." ³¹ But he said vehemently, "Even though I must die with you, I will not deny you." And all of them said the same.

Jesus Prays in Gethsemane

³² They went to a place called Gethsemane; and he said to his disciples, "Sit here while I pray." ³³ He took with him Peter and lames and John, and began to be distressed and agitated. ³⁴ And he said to them, "I am deeply grieved, even to death; remain here, and keep awake." ³⁵ And going a little farther, he threw himself on the ground and prayed that, if it were possible, the hour might pass from him. ³⁶ He said, "Abba, Father, for you all things are possible; remove this cup from me; yet, not what I want, but what you want." ³⁷ He came and found them sleeping; and he said to Peter, "Simon, are you asleep? Could you not keep awake one hour? ³⁸ Keep awake and pray that you may not come into the time of trial; the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak." ³⁹ And again he went away and prayed, saying the same words. ⁴⁰ And once more he came and found them sleeping, for their eyes were very heavy; and they did not know what to say to him. ⁴¹ He came a third time and said to them, "Are you still sleeping and taking your rest? Enough! The hour has come; the Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. ⁴² Get up, let us be going. See, my betrayer is at hand."

The Betrayal and Arrest of Jesus

⁴³ Immediately, while he was still speaking, Judas, one of the twelve, arrived; and with him there was a crowd with swords and clubs, from the chief priests, the scribes, and the elders. ⁴⁴ Now the betrayer had given them a sign, saying, "The one I will kiss is the man; arrest him and lead him away under guard." ⁴⁵ So when he came, he went up to him at once and said, "Rabbi!" and kissed him. ⁴⁶ Then they laid hands on him and arrested him. ⁴⁷ But one of those who stood near drew his sword and struck the slave of the high priest, cutting off his ear. ⁴⁸ Then Jesus said to them, "Have you come out with swords and clubs to arrest me as though I were a bandit? ⁴⁹ Day after day I was with you in the temple teaching, and you did not arrest me. But let the scriptures be fulfilled." ⁵⁰ All of them deserted him and fled. ⁵¹ A certain young man was following him, wearing nothing but a linen cloth. They caught hold of him, ⁵² but he left the linen cloth and ran off naked.

Jesus before the Council

⁵³ They took lesus to the high priest; and all the chief priests, the elders, and the scribes were assembled. ⁵⁴ Peter had followed him at a distance, right into the courtyard of the high priest; and he was sitting with the guards, warming himself at the fire. ⁵⁵ Now the chief priests and the whole council were looking for testimony against lesus to put him to death; but they found none. ⁵⁶ For many gave false testimony against him, and their testimony did not agree. ⁵⁷ Some stood up and gave false testimony against him, saying, ⁵⁸ "We heard him say, 'I will destroy this temple that is made with hands, and in three days I will build another, not made with hands." ⁵⁹ But even on this point their testimony did not agree. ⁶⁰ Then the high priest stood up before them and asked lesus, "Have you no answer? What is it that they testify against you?" ⁶¹ But he was silent and did not answer. Again the high priest asked him, "Are you the Messiah, the Son of the Blessed One?" ⁶² lesus said, "I am; and

'you will see the Son of Man seated at the right hand of the Power,' and 'coming with the clouds of heaven.'"

⁶³ Then the high priest tore his clothes and said, "Why do we still need witnesses? ⁶⁴ You have heard his blasphemy! What is your decision?" All of them condemned him as deserving death. ⁶⁵ Some began to spit on him, to blindfold him, and to strike him, saying to him, "Prophesy!" The guards also took him over and beat him.

Peter Denies Jesus

⁶⁶ While Peter was below in the courtyard, one of the servant-girls of the high priest came by. ⁶⁷ When she saw Peter warming himself, she stared at him and said, "You also were with Jesus, the man from Nazareth." ⁶⁸ But he denied it, saying, "I do not know or understand what you are talking about." And he went out into the forecourt. Then the cock crowed. ⁶⁹ And the servant-girl, on seeing him, began again to say to the bystanders, "This man is one of them." ⁷⁰ But again he denied it. Then after a little while the bystanders again said to Peter, "Certainly you are one of them; for you are a Galilean." ⁷¹ But he began to curse, and he swore an oath, "I do not know this man you are talking about." ⁷² At that moment the cock crowed for the second time. Then Peter remembered that Jesus had said to him, "Before the cock crows twice, you will deny me three times." And he broke down and wept.

Jesus before Pilate

15 As soon as it was morning, the chief priests held a consultation with the elders and scribes and the whole council. They bound Jesus, led him away, and handed him over to Pilate. ² Pilate asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" He answered him, "You say so." ³ Then the chief priests accused him of many things. ⁴ Pilate asked him again, "Have you no answer? See how many charges they bring against you." ⁵ But Jesus made no further reply, so that Pilate was amazed.

Pilate Hands Jesus over to Be Crucified

⁶ Now at the festival he used to release a prisoner for them, anyone for whom they asked. ⁷ Now a man called Barabbas was in prison with the rebels who had committed murder during the insurrection. ⁸ So the crowd came and began to ask Pilate to do for them according to his custom. ⁹ Then he answered them, "Do you want me to release for you the King of the Jews?" ¹⁰ For he realized that it was out of jealousy that the chief priests had handed him over. ¹¹ But the chief priests stirred up the crowd to have him release Barabbas for them instead. ¹² Pilate spoke to them again, "Then what do you wish me to do^[a] with the man you call the King of the Jews?" ¹³ They shouted back, "Crucify him!" ¹⁴ Pilate asked them, "Why, what evil has he done?" But they shouted all the more, "Crucify him!" ¹⁵ So Pilate, wishing to satisfy the crowd, released Barabbas for them; and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified.

The Soldiers Mock Jesus

¹⁶ Then the soldiers led him into the courtyard of the palace (that is, the governor's headquarters); and they called together the whole cohort. ¹⁷ And they clothed him in a purple cloak; and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on him. ¹⁸ And they began saluting him, "Hail, King of the Jews!" ¹⁹ They struck his head with a reed, spat upon him, and knelt down in homage to him. ²⁰ After mocking him, they stripped him of the purple cloak and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him out to crucify him.

The Crucifixion of Jesus

²¹ They compelled a passer-by, who was coming in from the country, to carry his cross; it was Simon of Cyrene, the father of Alexander and Rufus. ²² Then they brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha (which means the place of a skull). ²³ And they offered him wine mixed with myrrh; but he did not take it. ²⁴ And they crucified him, and divided his clothes among them, casting lots to decide what each should take.

²⁵ It was nine o'clock in the morning when they crucified him. ²⁶ The inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the lews." ²⁷ And with him they crucified two bandits, one on his right and one on his left. ²⁹ Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying, "Aha! You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, ³⁰ save yourself, and come down from the cross!" ³¹ In the same way the chief priests, along with the scribes, were also mocking him among themselves and saying, "He saved others; he cannot save himself. ³² Let the Messiah, ^[8] the King of Israel, come down from the cross now, so that we may see and believe." Those who were crucified with him also taunted him.

The Death of Jesus

³³ When it was noon, darkness came over the whole land^[h] until three in the afternoon. ³⁴ At three o'clock Jesus cried out with a loud voice, "Eloi, Eloi, Iema sabachthani?" which means, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "Listen, he is calling for Elijah." ³⁶ And someone ran, filled a sponge with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink, saying, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to take him down." ³⁷ Then Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last. ³⁸ And the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. ³⁹ Now when the centurion, who stood facing him, saw that in this way he breathed his last, he said, "Truly this man was God's Son!"

⁴⁰ There were also women looking on from a distance; among them were Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James the younger and of Joses, and Salome. ⁴¹ These used to follow him and provided for him when he was in Galilee; and there were many other women who had come up with him to Jerusalem.

The Burial of Jesus

⁴² When evening had come, and since it was the day of Preparation, that is, the day before the sabbath, ⁴³ Joseph of Arimathea, a respected member of the council, who was also himself waiting expectantly for the kingdom of God, went boldly to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. ⁴⁴ Then Pilate wondered if he were already dead; and summoning the centurion, he asked him whether he had been dead for some time. ⁴⁵ When he learned from the centurion that he was dead, he granted the body to Joseph. ⁴⁶ Then Joseph bought a linen cloth, and taking down the body, wrapped it in the linen cloth, and laid it in a tomb that had been hewn out of the rock. He then rolled a stone against the door of the tomb. ⁴⁷ Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of Joses saw where the body was laid.

Post Communion Prayer

Lord Jesus Christ, you humbled yourself in taking the form of a servant, and in obedience died on the cross for our salvation: give us the mind to follow you and to proclaim you as Lord and King, to the glory of God the Father.

HELP US SAVE THE ALL SAINTS' 'HOLST' PIPE ORGAN

The organ at All Saints' was built in 1887 by William Hill & Son, one of most respected English organ builders of the 19th century, and retains much of its original pipework and fine tonal character. The specification was drawn up by the vicar, George Gardiner and the first organist, Adolph von Holst, father of the composer Gustav Holst. As a boy, Gustav sang in the choir and wrote some of his first compositions for the instrument.

After more than 130 years of service, the original leatherwork is in a perilous state and many mechanical parts are worn out and need replacing. Constant atmospheric changes have taken their toll on wooden components, such as soundboards, and more than 2,500 pipes need to be cleaned and tonally regulated. We need to raise around £500,000 to put this cathedral-size organ on a sound footing so that it can provide another 100 years of service to the church and the local community.

Your support will be vital in helping us achieve our goal. A donation to our 'Sponsor a Pipe' appeal will make a real difference. Please have a look at our website www.sponsorapipe.co.uk where you can try out our 'virtual organ console', find lots of useful information on the project including videos, photographs, and recordings, and make a secure online donation. Information leaflets will also be available across the team churches for those who prefer more traditional payment methods. In addition to seeking local donations, we will be applying to major grant awarding bodies for funds. As we come out of lockdown we will be holding events to raise awareness of the project and publicly launch the 'Sponsor a Pipe' appeal. Do get involved and help us save this historic organ.

A CHRISTIAN PASSOVER - THURSDAY APRIL 1st.

Gas Green Baptist Church are holding a Passover meal over Zoom on Maundy Thursday, Ist April, starting at 7.00 pm. Details below: If you would like to take part, please contact Kate by email at admin@northchelt.org.uk and your email will be passed on to lain for the Zoom link to be sent out to you the day before

On the night before Jesus died he shared the Passover meal with his disciples – a special meal Jewish families still share once a year. The house would be cleaned, the best knives, forks and plates would be used and during the meal the family and guests would tell the story of Exodus again.

It was a traditional time to invite people as guests so that no-one had to celebrate on their own. Tonight we will follow the pattern of the Passover, but tell the story of lesus, the Lamb of God as well as the Passover. It uses some of the traditional prayers and symbols of a Jewish Passover, tells the story of the Passover but also has some New Testament readings as well.

You will need:

- A copy of the liturgy for everyone
- Wine/Ribena to drink as the service/meal proceeds
- One central candle
- Tea light candles for everyone
- A bowl with water and a towel
- A bowl of parsley
- A bowl with salt water
- Some Matzos (unleavened bread) or any crackers
- A bowl of horseradish
- A bowl of sweet jam –this is called haroset.

Haroset is made using chopped apple, nuts, cinnamon and wine.

Partially peel and chop or finely dice an apple leaving some skin on. Add chopped or ground walnuts or pecans and an equal amount of raisins. Season with cinnamon, honey and a little red sweet wine-or Ribena.

- The main meal normally Lamb and you can have it any way you choose. Hot with vegetables, in a wrap with some salad or a lamb sandwich. Vegetarians choose their favourite option!
- Suggested that we allow 15 minutes to eat the main meal. Everyone remains unmuted so conversation can flow whilst we eat.
- Suggested start time for the Seder meal is 7pm.
- Invitations to the Zoom meeting for Seder meal will be sent the previous day.

Before the service and meal begin you will need to have all the above items ready to ensure a smooth running once the service/meal starts.

The writing in the liturgy is set out in 3 ways

- ordinary text is read by the named individual;
- bold text is read by the whole group
- italic text are the instructions and don't need to be read out

Our Lent Journey so far —Week 4 SHELTER - finding security and the beginning of Week 5 WATER

SHELTER: Craft Thursday time! This week we have a way of building a mini shelter/house out of a cereal box. You will need an empty cereal box, scissors, glue, sellotape, colours and a small bowl or a large mug.

Step I: cut the cereal box open along one fold so you can easily access the brown centre.

Step 2: draw around the bowl or mug and cut out your circle.







Step 3: fold the circle into halves then into quarters.

Step 4: cut along one folded line to the centre of the circle.

Step 5: overlap two of the quarters and stick together to make a "roof" as shown.







Step 6: cut along the side of the box so you have a long strip of cardboard. Fold in half then open out again and fold the two side straight into the centre (as shown).

Step 7: again, overlap the two quarters and stick them together with glue to make the "walls".

Step 8: colour in both the roof and the walls with the design of your choice.

Step 9: stick the roof onto the walls with 3 pieces of tape. Now you have a beautiful miniature shelter as a representation of how God always provides a shelter for you! #nctmlent21 #lent





SAUSAGE & LENTIL

ONE-POT DINNER

Magnedients: (Server 4)

- 1 tablespoon oil

- 6 sausages

- 100g bacon, chopped

- 1 carrot

- 2 large potatoes

- 1 onion

- 2 sprigs fresh thyme

- 150g dried red lentils

- 400g chopped tomatoes

- 400ml veg./beef/chicken stock

Step 1: Heat the oil in a large frying pan. Prick the sawsages and add to the pan with the bacon, and sizzle on a low heat for a few minutes to brown the sawsages.

Step 2: Wash and chop the carret and potatoes. Rel and chop the onion. Add the vegetables to the pan, stirring to soften the onions. Chop the thyme and odd to the pan. Tip in the lentils and chopped tomatoes, and pour in the stock to cover.

Step 3: Bring to the boil and boil for a few minutes, then reduce the heat to medium and simmer for 25 minutes, or until the lentils are tender and the sausages are cooked through.







Week 5 WATER

Following the Government's announcement on Monday 22nd February, the Church of England are reviewing the Roadmap as to what this means for our churches, so things remain the same at the current time: churches are able to remain open for communal worship. This is provided that any person attending is:

Alone or

part of a group all from the same household or from two linked households (i.e. support bubble) You must not join any other group or 'mingle' with any person from another group.

If you are in an 'at-risk' category for COVID-19 the Government advice is to stay at home as much as possible and observe social distancing guidance. Please bear this in mind before attending services at our churches. We do have online services every Sunday at either 9.30 am or 10.30 am, followed by virtual coffee on Zoom. We also have some evening prayer services online on a Tuesday at 6.30 pm, Wednesday at 8.30 pm and Thursday at 6.30 pm. If you would like to attend Church when there are fewer people, then please note we are open for Individual Private Prayer as listed further down this page.

With the lockdown in place, a reminder that people should attend only their local churches, however, we look forward to welcoming visitors from further afield once the lock-down restrictions are eased.

Another reminder that any volunteers at our services should not present themselves for duty if they are in the 'at-risk' category.

Please follow all guidance that is in place to keep you and others safe.

When you do attend for our Sunday services, please wear a face mask BEFORE entering the church, and keep this on for the duration of your time in Church. (A mandatory requirement as set out by the Government since the 8th August 2020. Part of the new rules, including the 'Rule of 6' introduced on Monday 14th September 2020 is that they are backed up in law, and breaking of the rules can now result in a scale of increasing fines, and even imprisonment.). A document will be available on our website from the Church of England, and also in our churches, regarding the wearing of face masks and who is exempt. This includes the clergy while they are taking a service, provided they are able to keep the 2 metre distance from you (therefore a mask will be worn by the clergy when they offer communion). Information regarding the wearing of face masks in Church. You will only be able to attend a service as a household/support bubble following the 'Rule of 6'. There should be no mixing or 'mingling' between 'bubbles' while attending these services.

When you enter, please use the hand sanitiser available for your use.

Once in the Church, please sit where you are directed, either by the Sidespeople, or by the location of the service sheets, which have already been set out, keeping to the required social distance. Please DO NOT pick up the service sheets and move to another seat or place in the pews.

Before we were able to open our churches, the Clergy Team and Wardens spent a lot of time going through the guidelines and creating risk assessments to enable us to do so (as required by the Church of England and the Government).

We want to be able to keep our Churches open for private prayer and worship, and can only do this with your co-operation in following these guidelines.

There are new guidelines for places of worship that have been issued by the Government this week, which the Church of England are going through to amend their existing guidelines on their website, and any changes that are made will be implemented in the coming days as we receive them.

Thank you for your continued support in enabling us to offer private prayer and services.

We are endeavouring to keep in contact with you all through various platforms and by offering online services and prayers.
